PLANTATION WARRANT

STATE OF MAINE,

FRANKLIN COUNTY, SS.

To Omer Dyer, a Constable in the Plantation of Coplin, in said County of Franklin: Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Plantation, qualified by law to vote in plantation affairs, to assemble at the Schoolhouse, in said Planation, on the 2nd day of March, 1931, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To choose all necessary plantation officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of Common Schools for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of Free High School for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for text-books and school supplies for the ensuing year.
- ART. 7. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for transporting scholars for the ensuing year.
- ART. 8. To see if the plantation will vote to raise money, and how much, for the County Health Nurse.
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the maintenance of roads in summer for the ensuing year.

- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the maintenance of roads in winter for the ensuing year.
- Arr. 11. To see if the plantation will vote to raise money, and how much, for more snow fence for the ensuing year.
- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the maintenance of fifty-fifty highway for the ensuing year.
- ART. 13. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the maintenance of State Aid highway patrol for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see how much money the plantation will vote to raise for the maintenance of Improved Sections of 3rd Class highway.
- ART. 15. To see if the plantation will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- ART. 16. To see if the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$300.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the plantation is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- ART. 17. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
- ART. 18. To see what the plantation will vote to do in regard to paying H. L. Tague for damages on barn, caused by fill made in road, front of same.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay plantation officers' bills for the ensuing year.

ART. 20. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay the plantation debt.

ART. 21. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the abatement of taxes for the ensuing year.

ART. 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Assessors give notice that they will be in session, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at the Schoolhouse at 12.30 in the afternoon on the day of said meeting.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Plantation of Coplin:

I hereby submit, as required by law, the annual report for the municipal year ending January 31, 1931.

An authority on education has well said: "No matter how well the school system may be planned, no matter how elaborate the care with which State and local officials attempt to direct the work of the schools, it is, after all, the Teacher who makes the school an effective agency for education, or defeats the best efforts of others to do so."

Coplin Plantation is especially fortunate in its teacher for the present school year. I have never seen work more efficiently handled nor more and better work accomplished, than is being accomplished by Miss Wilbur this year. I am submitting her report with that of the County Nurse in connection with this report.

Our attendance for the school year 1929-30 was not as satisfactory as that of the preceding year. With an enrollment of 16 we had an average attendance of 12.3.

During the past year the schoolhouse was shingled and it is in an excellent state of repair. We still have in the Repairs Account an unexpended balance of \$32.88 which should be sufficient for the coming municipal year.

Because of the large unexpended balance carried in the C. S. Account it seems to me only necessary to raise the amount which the law demands for the coming municipal year. My recommendations are as follows:

Teacher's Report

Coplin, Maine, January 23, 1931.

To the Superintendent, School Committee and Citizens:

I submit the following report of the Coplin School for the eighteen weeks that school has been in session beginning September 8, 1930 and closing January 23, 1931.

Grade 2 - Eldora J. Bachelder, Egbert W. Price

Grade 1 - Leslie L. Price

The average attendance for the period of eighteen weeks was 8.88+.

Because of four pupils not entering school until the third week and by so many pupils having to be absent because of illness our average attendance is low.

Eldora Bachelder has not missed any time, Junior Scribner has missed only three-fourths of one day and Verne Scribner only one and three-fourths days.

The parents have been very kind in regard to their children studying at home and the children, themselves, seem very willing to do home work and also to work after school at night. Therefore we have been able to complete all of the work planned for this half year with good rank.

In all schools of standard grade a certain portion of school work must be accomplished each year. Leading educators believe that the amount of work completed in each grade should be of equal importance in regard to quality and quantity because the grammar school is the foundation on which higher education is builded.

With this in mind, at the beginning of the school year reviews of the work of the previous grades were given and the work for this year carefully planned.

As the half year of our school closes I feel that we have completed an amount of school work equal to that of any standard school of the same grades, in the same time, in the state.

The pupils of the Coplin School are studious, honest and easy to govern. They are very friendly with their teacher and I am sure that she appreciates their friendship.

I find on my list that we have received thirty-two visits from our friends. Please try and make our visiting list grow.

Mr. Sinclair has made fourteen long visits to our school this year. He is very appreciative of all that we are attempting to do in our school work.

We are very fortunate in having a superintendent who is so much interested in the progress of our schools and the welfare of our boys and girls.

It is very pleasant for me to be here in Coplin as your teacher again and I thank you for the opportunity.

In closing, I wish to thank the taxpayers, who support our school, the Superintendent and School Committee, the parents and the pupils for their kind coöperation, loyalty and support in all affairs pertaining to our school. I also wish to thank the people where I board for the pleasant home life that I enjoy with them.

Report of Public Health Nurse

To the Citizens of Coplin Plantation:

I hereby submit my second report as the Public Health Nurse for the fiscal year Feb. 1, 1930 to Feb. 1, 1931.

The school in Coplin Plantation was visited in April, May and June for re-examination of students for SEVEN POINT Pins and Certificates. Plans were also made to join with Lang Plantation and Stratton Schools in the Health Parade in May. The parade was most successful and we hope will be repeated next year.

In October the students had their Routine Health Examination and during the year five received SEVEN POINT Pins. Each year the number of corrections of defects increases and it is most gratifying to have the increased interest of parents and teachers in the importance of perfect physical health of those under their care.

The nurse and the North Franklin County Public Health Committee again extend thanks and appreciation to teachers and others who have cooperated with them in the Health work and also to those who assisted with the sale of Christmas Seals. This work is supported by the town appropriation and the money from the Sale of Seals is used in the prevention of Tuberculosis Campaign.
