To the Members of the School Board, Parents, and Citizens of Coplin:

The perplexing problem confronting all school officials is how to provide an adequate education for the youth of today in order that they may successfully solve their future problems in this ever changing world. No master plan can be devised which will assure us of good citizens in our democracy, but we recognize the need for developing each child to the limit of his abilities, and that this development should be social, emotional, and physical as well as intellectual. Many see this need but fail to recognize that in providing for it it is impossible to use the tools of twenty years ago for producing a product to successfully compete in the world of tomorrow.

There has been no appreciable increase in the income from Coplin's Reserved Land Fund during the past ten years. The appropriation for schools has remained the same for the past seven years while the costs of education have more than doubled during this period. Let us examine the financial records. In December 1947 we had an over-all balance of \$2,115.55; in December 1948, it was \$1,988.96; this year it is \$1,460.97. Next year it will be still less. These facts are not surprising when we consider the proportional increased costs in other fields along with the increasing number of children.

The State will not allow payment for hot lunches taken from the regular school account. Money should be raised to cover this deficit,

and if you wish to continue providing lunches, more money should be raised.

The schoolhouse needs painting very badly and I urge that the balance in the school repair account be used for this purpose. If more money is needed to put this building in good repair, it should be raised. This little building is the only semblance of a municipal organization which you have. Why not keep it in good repair and use it for community functions? A farm bureau could hold meetings there: A baked bean supper with an entertainment would be another idea.

In accordance with Chapter 16, Section 3 of the Revised Statutes of 1944, and at your request, the records of Coplin Plantation have been audited by Auditor R. M. Parsons for the period January 1, 1948 to December 31, 1948 inclusive.

The examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which were considered necessary. Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the Plantation appear to have been appropriately handled.

Exhibits and Schedules incorporated in this report present the result of the financial operations of the Plantation for the period designated. Comments are also included which may prove of interest to you.

COMMENTS

COPLIN PLANTATION January 1, 1948 to December 31, 1948

An examination has been completed of the books and records of Coplin Plantation for the year ended December 31, 1948. This examination was conducted in conformity with generally accepted auditing standards and included a check of all cash transactions, and such test checks of other operations as seemed advisable.

ASSETS

The cash balance of \$2,838.97 as reflected by the records of the Treasurer were reconciled with the December 29, 1948 bank statement furnished by the Rangeley Trust Company, and found to be correctly stated.

An analysis of receipts and deposits for the year indicated that all monies, for which receipts had been written, had been promptly deposited.

All expenditures were made by check from properly authorized

Accounts receivable totaled \$14.83. This amount represented differences in prior years' tax accounts and was due from the Tax Collector.

The 1948 tax commitment book was added, checked and found to be in agreement with the Assessors' records. Approximately 60% of the current commitment was collected. Taxes outstanding in the amount of \$1,482.63 were checked and listed.

Transactions affecting prior years' taxes were examined and found to have been properly handled.

RESERVE AND SURPLUS

The reserve for authorized expenditures totaling \$2,835.30 represents the balances of certain appropriation accounts which have been carried forward to the ensuing year. The detail is presented on Exhibit B.

Unappropriated surplus at the beginning of the year of \$1,216.06 was increased by \$351.54 as a result of current operations and \$14.80 appreciation on investments.

GENERAL

The Treasurer and Tax Collector furnished corporate surety bonds.

Plantation Warrant

STATE OF MAINE

COUNTY OF FRANKLIN

To Earl Bachelder, a Constable in the Plantation of Coplin in said Franklin County: Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of Coplin Plantation, qualified to vote in Plantation affairs, to assemble at the Schoolhouse in said Plantation, on the sixth day of March, 1950, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to vote on the following articles:

- Article 1. To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To elect a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if Plantation will vote to accept the reports of Municipal Officers as printed.
- Art. 4. To elect all necessary Plantation Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to pay Plantation Officers' bills for the ensuing year. Estimate \$465.00.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for Elementary School tuition for the ensuing year. Estimate \$100.00.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for High School tuition for the ensuing year. Estimate \$100.00.

- Art. 8. To see if Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the \$20.00 asked for Public Health Nursing, said sum to be expended for local service.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for Plantation roads in summer, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting bushes on Plantation roads for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Plantation roads in winter and Snow Fence.
- Art. 12. To see if Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$242.00 for maintenance of State Highway in winter for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chapter 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Third Class Roads for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for Discount on Taxes for the ensuing year. Estimate \$60.00.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to buy Officers' Bonds for the ensuing year. Estimate \$32.50.
- Art. 17. What are we to do about our Snow Fence Shed? It is falling down.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for Hot Lunches for Coplin pupils at Stratton School.

Art. 19. To see whether or not the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine, in accordance with the provision of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Art. 20 Will the Plantation vote to pay any unpaid bills to legally come before said meeting?

The Assessors give notice that they will be in session at the School-house for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at 12.30 in the afternoon on the day of said meeting.
