To the Members of the School Board and Parents and Citizens of Coplin:

Coplin does not have many financial worries about the Schools as the Timberland money comes in every year and can not be used for anything but Schools. The balance has to be carried in the Town Treasury from year to year.

Most of the School troubles are due to the fact that there are not teachers enough to go around. 101,612 emergency certificates have been issued for this School year. 625,872 new teachers must be found during the next five years to supplement the regular supply.

Farmington Normal has only 24 teachers graduating this year and

that will not fill the needs for this section of the State.

In spite of the fact that teachers' salaries have been raised they are in reality getting less than in 1939. The cost of living has gone up 60 per cent. As for the Superintendent of Schools, in spite of the fact his salary has been raised in reality his money will buy 30 to 40 per cent less than in 1939. Where this inflation will go to it is hard to tell. One thing sure we will all be broke if it goes much higher.

The Coplin people are very friendly and good to work with.

The average town raised for Schools .022. Coplin only raised .00038. Quite a difference. All to the good though.

County Health Nurse Annual Report

COPLIN — DECEMBER 1947

REPORT OF AUDIT

COMMENTS

Re: Audit of Accounts — Coplin Plantation January 1, 1946 to December 31, 1946

CASH

The cash receipts were checked and found to be correctly recorded and promptly deposited.

The cash balance of \$3,800.89 was reconciled, and found to be in agreement with the depository.

All expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants.

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

There was no change in the accounts receivable totaling \$14.83, representing differences in the 1941-42-43 Tax Collector's accounts during the year under review.

TAXES RECEIVABLE

The 1946 tax commitment book was added and found to be in agreement with the records of the Assessors.

Approximately 97% of the current commitment was collected. Outstanding taxes were checked and listed.

All transactions affecting prior years' taxes were checked, and the outstanding taxes, according to the records of the Collector, listed.

INVESTMENTS

Investments in the amount of \$74.00 were examined and listed.

SURPLUS

The unappropriated surplus of \$1,835.20 at the beginning of the fiscal year was reduced by \$409.74 as a result of current operations.

GENERAL

The Tax Collector and Treasurer furnished local surety bonds. However, the statements of financial ability, as prescribed by Chapter 81, Section 81, and Chapter 80, Section 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1944, were not filed.

Vouchers and payrolls were examined to the extent deemed necessary, and so far as could be determined from this examination, all charges appeared to be reasonable and proper and correctly recorded.

The excise tax receipts were checked and added, and all collections had been deposited with the Treasurer.

Plantation Warrant

STATE OF MAINE

COUNTY OF FRANKLIN

To Earl Bachelder, a Constable in the Plantation of Coplin in said County of Franklin: Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of Coplin Plantation, qualified to vote in the Plantation affairs, to assemble at the Schoolhouse in said Plantation, on the first day of March, 1948, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to vote on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To elect a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if Plantation will vote to accept the reports of Municipal Officers as printed.
- Art. 4. To elect all necessary Plantation Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to pay Plantation Officers' bills for the ensuing year. Estimate \$495.00
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for Elementary tuition for the ensuing year. Estimate \$20.00
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for High School tuition for the ensuing year. Estimate \$15.00

- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for Public Health Nurse. They ask for \$20.00.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for Plantation Roads in summer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting bushes on Plantation roads for the ensuing year. Estimate \$40.00
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for Plantation Roads in winter and snow fence for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see if the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$719.50 for Summer and Winter maintenance of State Highway for the ensuing year. \$477.50 for Summer, \$242 for Winter.
- Art. 13. To see if the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$54 for maintenance of State Aid Highway for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provision of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944 as amended.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for discount of taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16. To see whether or not the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with provision of Chap. 80, Sec. 95 of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Art. 17. To see whether or not the Plantation will vote to buy an adding machine for use of the Plantation Officers, and how much money the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for the same.

Art. 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Assessors give notice that they will be in session at the School-house for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at 12.30 o'clock in the afternoon on the day of said meeting.
